



## Bishr-ul-Khair and Bishrus Sharr (The Bishr of Good and the bishr of Evil)

### Description

#### Disavowing Innovations and Their Adherents

The eloquent theologian and skilled debater, Abū 'Abd al-Raā, ყmān Bishr ibn Ghiyāth al-Marāssā, was a Jahmā and held a prominent position in the state. He was known to drink *nabādh* (fermented beverage). Once, he remarked to a man named Kāmil (perfect and complete): *His name itself is proof that the name is distinct from the named.*<sup>1</sup>

He passed away in the year 218 AH. Thus, *Bishr al-Sharr* (Bishr of Evil) and *Bishr al-ā, ڏā* (was Bishr of Good) were opposites, just as Aā, ყmad ibn ڦanbal was Aā, ყmad of the *Sunnah*, while Aā, ყmad ibn Abā Dāwūd was Aā, ყmad of *Innovation*.

A person declared an innovator, even if his deviation is great, is not the same as a disbeliever by origin, nor is he like a Jew or a Magian. Allah does not equate one who believes in Him, His Messenger ڀو, and the Last Day ڀو who prays, fasts, performs Hajj, and gives charity, even if he commits major sins, goes astray, and innovates ڀو with one who rejects the Messenger, worships idols, discards the divine laws, and disbelieves. However, we disavow innovations and their adherents for the sake of Allah.
