$\hfill \square$ If you wished, you could save for yourself, for what you spend will not return to you.â
Al-Maâ \coprod mun then said, â \coprod Whoever wishes to honour me, let them honour my guest
Muhammad.â∏ Gifts and wealth came to him, but he did not save a single dirham,
saying, The generous one is not swayed by lifeâ $ \square $ s trials'â $ \square $ (i.e. a truly generous or
noble person remains steadfast and unchanged, even when faced with lifeâ∏ s
difficulties or challenges)
