His Fearless Honesty in Hadith Criticism

The poet Ibn al-RA«mA« said:

 \hat{a}_{\square} I have never seen anyone speak the truth about scholars like $Ya\acute{a}_{\square} Yy\ddot{A}_{\square}$ (ibn $Ma\hat{E}_{\i}\ddot{A}$ %n). Others were biased in their speech. \hat{a}_{\square}

I (Imam Dhahabi) say:

- This statement by ʿAbdullÄ□ h ibn al-RÅ«mÄ« is not accepted.
- We do not claim infallibility for the hadith critics, but they are:
 - The most accurate scholars.
 - The least prone to error.
 - The most just and impartial.
 - The furthest from bias.

As a result, when they agree on the reliability or weakness of a narrator, hold on to their judgment firmly, and do not deviate from it, lest you regret it.

As for the occasional outlier opinions, they are not to be followed \hat{a}_{\square} so do not waste your effort debating them.
